Attendance in general - every day matters

Blockhouse Bay Intermediate prides itself on our high attendance rates. We currently sit way above the national average and significantly above intermediates.

Regular attendance (95%) is key to emotional, social and academic wellbeing and success. Our attendance procedure outlines how we do things here.

Our theory of improvement tells why we do attendance so well.

The impact of Covid showed us just how important attendance mattered to student achievement and wellbeing. Being present ensured students were learning and had the best possible chance of success in their academic and mental wellbeing pathway. It also affords us the opportunity to get on top of any concerns as soon as possible and support whānau to have successful outcomes.

This year attendance is tracking around 94% (our target is 96%) and attendance is a key measure of achieving our strategic goal.



Kea crossings

There are yellow or fluorescent yellowgreen 'children' and 'school' combination warning signs 65 metres before the crossing on each approach.

These warning signs are permanent, whether the crossing is being used or not. They're the same as those used outside schools to warn there may be pedestrians crossing ahead.

When the kea crossing is operating, two types of removable signs are used. These signs include two fluorescent orange 'Children' flag signs and the swing-out orange school patrol STOP signs.




Upcoming: Brian Falkner to visit BBI!
