New Zealand Curriculum update

The Ministry of Education (MoE) has recently released a Parent and Whānau Portal to support conversations around your child's learning, progress, and next steps. The Parent Portal aims to empower whānau to take an active role in their child's education, with practical videos, activities, and resources to support learning. It includes a parent-friendly version of the New Zealand Curriculum to help whānau know what their child is learning, why it's important, and when they'll learn it.

The MoE has also developed engaging videos to guide parents, caregivers and whānau on topics such as preparing for the first day of school, understanding the first 6 months of learning, as well as resources and activities for supporting learning at home.

As the national curriculum continues to be refreshed over the next few years, the MoE will add more activities. These will cater to different year levels and learning needs. The goal is for the Parent Portal to become a tool for every family, regardless of their child's learning journey or language needs.

Tuckshop Reminder – \$20 Limit

Just a friendly reminder that students should bring no more than \$20 per day for the tuckshop. There are a few reasons for this:

- It helps promote healthier eating choices (and avoids those sugar spikes!).
- Less money means less chance of it going missing.

REMINDERS

Rubbish at school

It is important to maintain a clean and tidy environment at school, and a big part of that is properly disposing of our rubbish. We have bins conveniently located throughout the school grounds, making it easy for everyone to dispose of their waste responsibly. However, sometimes we forget to use them. Parents, please remind our students to make use of the bins whenever they have rubbish to discard. Let's all work together to keep our school clean and welcoming for everyone.

Reporting Absences

Don't forget to report any absences – either through our website or by calling the office and leaving a message. Always report absences to the office and not directly to the classroom teacher. If you drop your child off late or they arrive late (after 8.45am), they must sign in at the office before going to class, to avoid unnecessary calls to parents.

All visitors must report to the office

If you are picking up your child early or dropping something off, we require all visitors to report directly to the office and not to approach the class. Classes are busy spaces of learning, and students may be in SPEC (specialist subjects) or other learning activities. The office is the best place to help you.

Illness and doctor appointments

A reminder not to send your sick child to school. Your sick child touches surfaces, infects others, is sent to the office and then our admin staff fall sick, students fall sick, staff fall sick, and a cycle is established. Please organise doctor/specialist appointments for after school. Mornings are especially important to your child's learning, where we cover the essentials, and any missed lessons can and will impact students' sequential knowledge in core subject areas.

The back gate and the dental clinic/staff car park

Given the size of our school, the main and back gates are extremely busy during school drop-offs and pickups. Our car parks by Castle Grove are reserved for the community dental clinic and staff. Please do not add to the chaos by trying to enter or park in these areas during peak traffic times.

Speed Limits are Changing on Roads Near our School

These changes will happen between 12-19 May 2025.

The Ministry of Transport has approved the Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limit 2024. This updated Rule requires Auckland Transport to reverse the permanent 30km per hour speed limits introduced around our school. Speed limits are changing on around 1,500 Auckland roads. 
