Supporting a Smooth Transition from Year 8 to Year 9

As we head into Term 3, the shift from Year 8 to high school becomes a big focus for many of our families. Transitioning to Year 9 can be a mix of excitement and uncertainty for both students and parents alike.

Here's how you can support this journey:

Enrolment: Check your in-zone secondary school's enrolment timeline and key dates. Most out-of-zone applications also closes in Term 3 with early deadlines.

Open Days: Make time to attend school open days and information evenings. These visits help students visualise their new environment, easing anxiety and building confidence.


Wellbeing: Emotional readiness is just as important as academic readiness. Conversations at home about routines, friendships, and managing change can support a sense of stability. It is definitely ok to be apprehensive.

Stay Connected: If you have concerns or need advice, we are here to support your whānau through the transition. Ms Karen Mills will be available in the library to support you during Student-led Conferences (SLC).

Understanding Our Impact through Structured Equation Modelling (SEM) at BBI

At BBI, we are committed to making data-informed decisions that improve outcomes for every learner. 2025 marks our second cycle of SEM - a powerful tool used to explore the complex relationships between different aspects of school life: learning behaviours, wellbeing, attendance, engagement, and academic achievement.

SEM provides a visual "map" of how different factors in our school environment interact and contribute to student success. By looking at our data across student, teacher, and whānau voice, we are able to identify what's working well, and what needs further attention. This helps us focus our energy and resources where they will make the most meaningful difference.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

The above results are shown as numbers (called correlation coefficients) between 0 and 1:

- A result closer to 0 means no connection between two things.
- Around 0.5 suggests a moderate relationship.
- Over 0.7 signals a strong, positive connection.

Key highlights from our 2024 SEM analysis:

- Attendance is the strongest predictor of achievement, with a correlation of .94. This means students who are regularly at school are significantly more likely to experience academic success. This aligns with our ongoing messaging around the importance of being present and on time.
- Sense of Belonging, Grit, and Motivation to Learn all showed strong positive relationships with improved learning outcomes and decreased behavioural concerns. This reaffirms our emphasis on teaching social-emotional learning and fostering a safe, inclusive environment where students feel connected.
- A **decrease in behaviour incidents** (such as defiance or disruption) showed a strong link to improved wellbeing and learning progress, especially in the areas of writing and mathematics.
- Our greatest opportunity for growth is in Writing. While our SEM data shows
 positive relationships in this area, they are not as strong as other subjects, and we
 want to ensure writing is a strength across the board. This will be a strategic focus
 in our 2026–2028 planning, within the New Zealand Curriculum refresh.

What's next?

We will be incorporating the insights from SEM into our strategic planning and are committed to continuing this work with our staff, students, and whānau. We are proud that our approach to wellbeing, learning behaviours, and student voice is making a measurable difference and we want to keep lifting outcomes for every learner.

During our next SLC on **Thursday 17 July,** we will be hosting a community consultation session in the library to seek your input into the next phase of our strategic planning. We look forward to seeing you there.

Together, we can continue to make BBI a place where every student feels known, valued, and equipped to thrive.

Mid-Year Reporting and Learning Pathways

Tomorrow your child's mid-year report will be sent home via email. This provides a snapshot of their progress across the curriculum so far this year. Alongside this report, your child will also share their Learning Pathway - a supplementary document that offers more in-depth insight into their learning journey.

The Learning Pathway includes assessment results, samples of work, and teacher comments, all of which support the overall teacher judgement of your child's achievement and progress. This document is designed to give you a clearer picture of how your child is working towards the expectations of the refreshed New Zealand Curriculum.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

From the Ministry of Education:

"As part of our focus on lifting student achievement we have introduced new, knowledge – rich and internationally – comparable curriculum this year for Maths in Years 0–8 and English in Years 0–6, and Te Reo Rangatira Years 0–6 and Pāngarau Years 0–8 wāhanga ako.



This means we are currently changing from the old to the new curriculum. We want to acknowledge that schools and kura will only have been using the new curricula from the start of 2025, which includes new teaching and assessment methods and content.

Because of this you could see a change in your child's progress or achievement compared to previous years which may be the result of changes in the curriculum expectations for your child's year level. If you have concerns or questions about your child's achievement, we strongly suggest you talk with your child's teacher or kaiako. They will also have used their own observations, classroom tasks and other tests to report on the progress your child is making. (Ministry of Education, May 2025 Statement on Curriculum and Progress)"

We encourage you to review both the report and the Learning Pathway with your child, and celebrate their achievements, effort, and next learning steps. These documents will be the foundation for our SLC, where you will have an opportunity to hear from your child and their teacher about their growth and goals. **Bookings open from Friday 27 June.**


